#### From the Facilitator

I've often referred to them as The Magnificent Seven. These seven students know how to get things done! I think I can speak for all of us when I say that we always had fun along the way. Bonds are established during the CEO year due to working so closely together and the necessity of depending on each other. They are lasting. I'm certain my previous classes will agree.

While the world gradually returns to normalcy we've come to appreciate the small things. Being able to re-enter guest high schools and speak to their juniors has been at the top of the list. Not having to wear our masks ranks up there as well. We have also traveled to Effingham twice, Greenville twice and look forward to our end of the year trip to St. Louis in May. The virtual world has taught us well and we continue to utilize Zoom with long distance guest speakers and Midland's Fearless Founders webinars. We found FaceTime works best when we had quarantine issues. And while we're thankful for technology, we're even more thankful to be meeting in person and be out in the community again.

This year's class wanted to try something new. In November, during Old Tyme Christmas, they created a gourmet popcorn "pop up shop" and completely sold out within a few hours! Half of the profits were donated to Eden's Glory in Greenville, a home for trafficked women. The other half was deposited into the class account. It was a lot of fun and we accomplished our goals of making the CEO brand visible and one that gives back to our community.

Plans for the class business started out rocky. It seemed our first idea, a "Taste of..." event was doomed to fail due to a chronic shortage of employees and skyrocketing food prices within the restaurant industry. So, we "pivoted". This may be the most overused word of 2021, but that is exactly what we did. The class took their original idea and turned it into a successful murder mystery event called "Fayette County CEO Presents A Taste of Mystery." They wrote and produced their own murder mystery game and provided snack tables

one could only dream of. The venue was packed (thank you Vandalia Moose Lodge for donating use of the facility), silent auction items were successful, and "a good time had by all." The profits of this business allowed each student to be granted \$500 to begin their own businesses, take an end of the year trip to St. Louis, make sizable donations to charities of their choice, and become investors in Fayette County CEO.

One of my goals for this year was to increase our class size numbers and have representation from each school in the county. I am pleased to say that next year there are students from Ramsey, Vandalia, Brownstown, St. Elmo and Mid-America Preparatory School. I credit this year's group for doing an incredible job speaking to each of the junior classes about the CEO experience. Each of them is sold on the program and it comes across genuinely when they are speaking. We also have guidance counselors and faculty members within each school who are actively promoting our program, as well as our board members who are always looking for an opportunity to sing the praises of CEO.

Of course, none of this would be possible without the forty-one investors who pledge \$1,000 a year for a three-year commitment; many continuing for another three years. We are eternally grateful for the generosity of these individuals and businesses! We are also thankful for so many people who give of their time to host business visits and speak to our class. Others buy advertising on our badges, donate silent auction items, sponsor events....it goes on and on. Fayette County has embraced the CEO program and supports it.

CEO is not just a business class; it is real world experience. We put into practice every day what we learn. It is experiential, educational, and transformational. It is also a community economic development tool. Students are encouraged to go out into the world and gain knowledge and experience, and then come back home to put that knowledge and experience into practice. Our investors and supporters invest in our students as well as our communities. Thank you for believing in the CEO model and believing in our students!

CEO has taught me so many skills that I will continue to use in my future. CEO has helped me to better my public speaking and taught me how to keep a productive,


professional conversation going. CEO has also allowed me to better myself while networking and making connections. I have had the opportunity to meet some amazing people through the CEO Program.



Our guests enjoyed the approximately hour-long game and the wildly acclaimed snack tables that included a taco bar, dessert bar, Italian station, enormous charcuterie table, and a chocolate fountain. ### BUSINESS PLANS, BANKER DAY, AND SHARK TANKS


